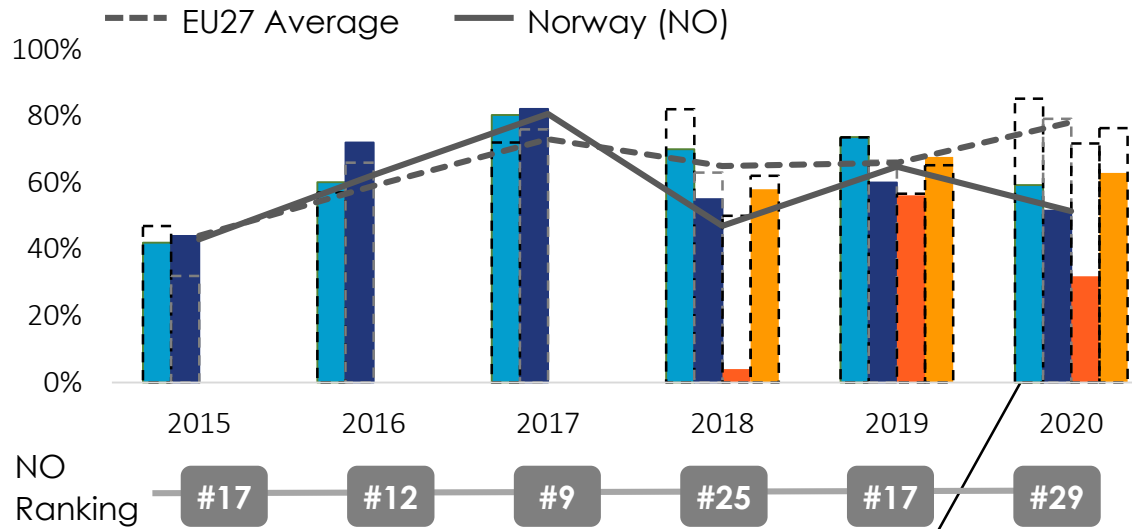

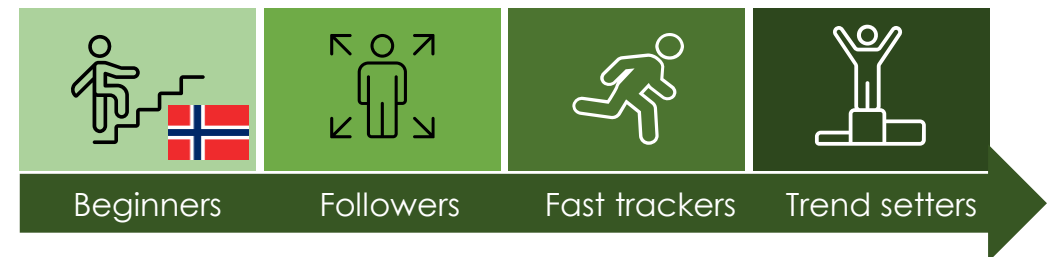

MATURITY LEVEL RATING

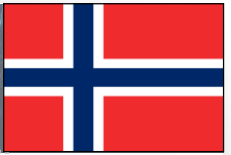


OVERALL MATURITY LEVEL SEGMENTATION

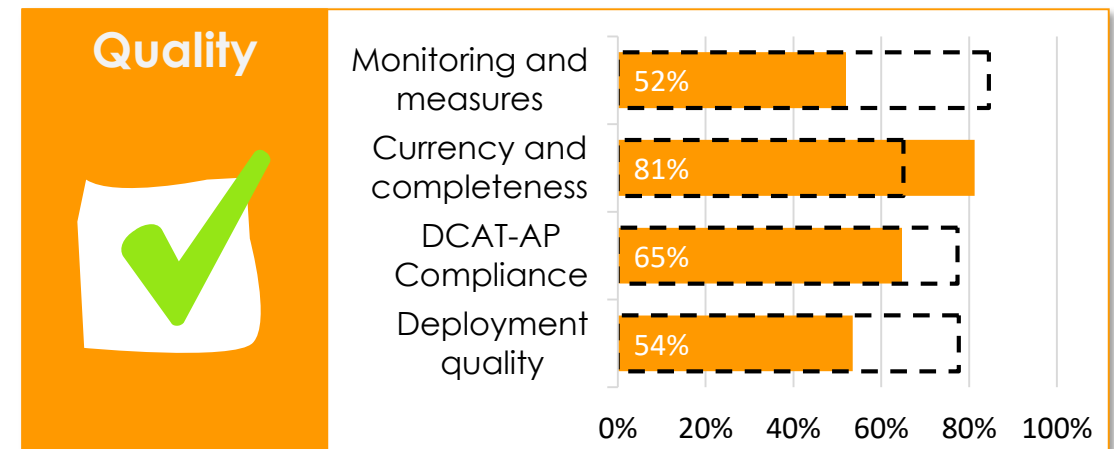
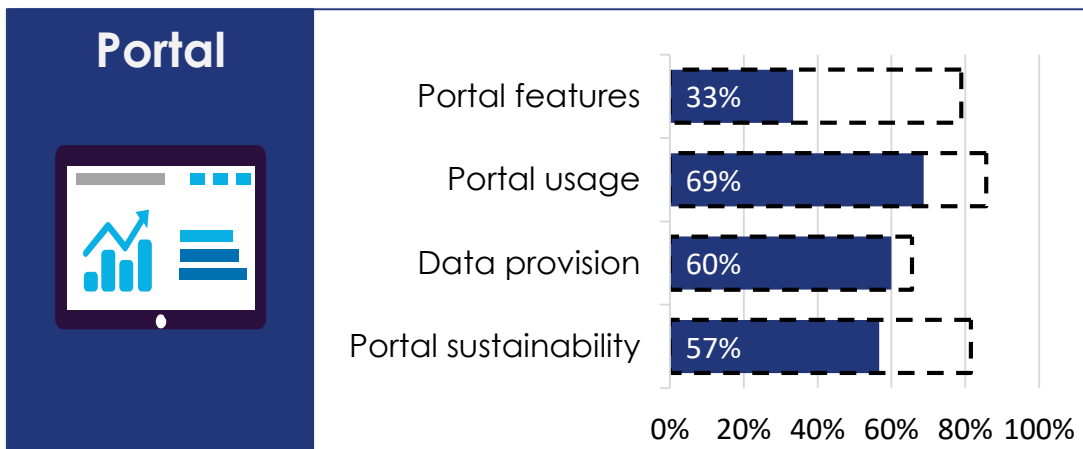
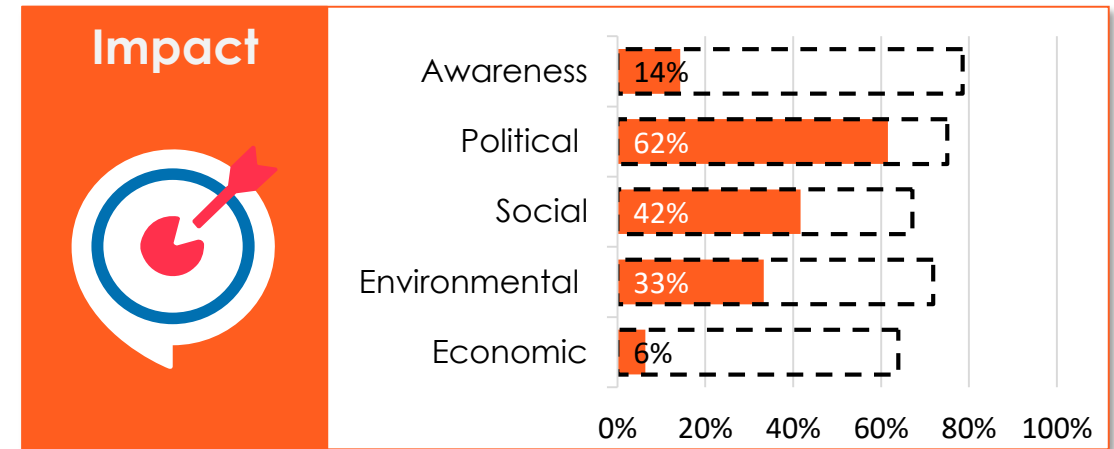
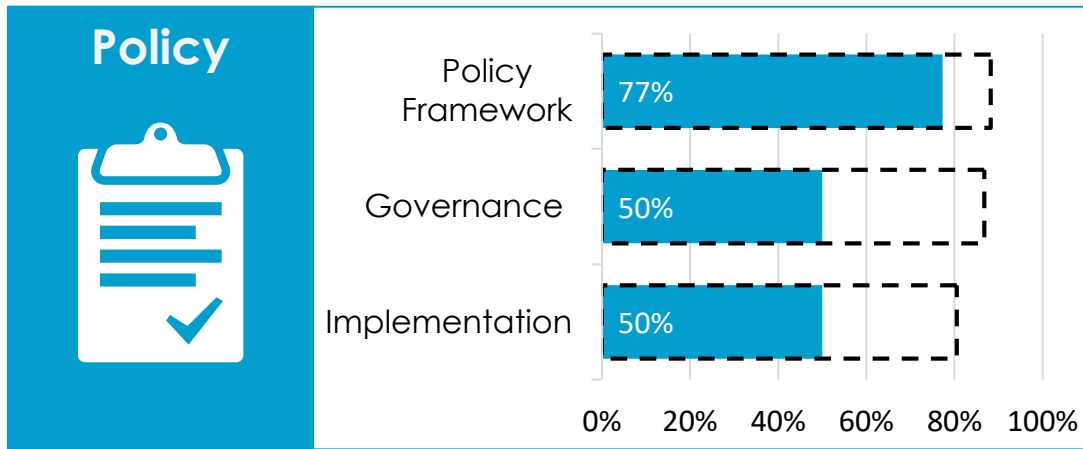

Legal

Other

Norway has increased networking activities aimed at public sector to address issues such as the quality and sustainability of open data, the low awareness of open data at local and municipality level, and the low technical competences for open data in smaller public organisations.



OPEN DATA RE-USE

Norway is one of the few countries where the national open data portal does not have a designated area for open data use cases to provide further insight and inspiration into how open data can be used to create services, applications, and products.

Several of the national agencies, however, monitor the re-use of open data e.g. the National Map Authority and the National Road Authority. The national Road Authority has some datasets that require user registration; on these they can monitor the number of users. Most datasets, however, are open with no registration. It is possible to monitor API-usage, number of downloads etc., and there are statistics for this.

Open data is re-used, for example, to increase transparency in government. The platform [Statsregnskapet](#) shows central government expenditures and revenues and makes it easy for visitors to see how money is spent.
